- Restate the prompt.
- Write thesis statement, indicating which position is better supported by the text.

•	<u>Sample thesis 1</u> : The essay written by X is more effective because of the author's use of
	(1) and (2), and because Y fails to make a strong
	argument because of (3)
	Sample thesis 2: Alternatively, you could write: The essay written by X is more effective
	because of (1), (2), and (3)
	(Just remember that if you use this argument, you will also have to write about the other
	essay in your body paragraph's.

Body Paragraphs

Paragraph 2/Body Paragraph 1: point 1 supporting your thesis

- Introduce topic 1 in 1-2 sentences.
- Share quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in 1-2 sentences.
- Provide the specific quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in quotes.
- Explain how the quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. supports your argument and tie it back to topic sentence in 1-3 sentences.

Paragraph 3/Body Paragraph 2: point 2 supporting your thesis

- Introduce topic 1 in 1-2 sentences.
- Share quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in 1-2 sentences.
- Provide the specific quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in quotes.
- Explain how the quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. supports your argument and tie it back to topic sentence in 1-3 sentences.

Paragraph 4: Body Paragraph 3: point 3 supporting your thesis

- Introduce topic 1 in 1-2 sentences.
- Share quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in 1-2 sentences.
- Provide the specific quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. in quotes.
- Explain how the quote/fact/statistic/example/etc. supports your argument and tie it back to topic sentence in 1-3 sentences.

Conclusion:

- Restate your thesis statement.
- Summarize your main points from the body paragraphs.
- Add conclusion sentence.
